It offers consultations in oncology for oncological facilities, provides preventive care, and evaluates the expert level of delivering cancer care throughout the Slovak Republic. In research and development, it participates in clinical trials and education of cancer researchers. Importantly, the National Cancer Institute cooperates with other health, academic and scientific institutions at the national and international levels.



National Oncology Institute

serves as a clinical research, academic and educational platform. The main mission of the institute is comprehensively and independently participate in the implementation of the goals of the National Oncology Program in cooperation with other stakeholders, including the Ministry of Health of the Slovak Republic, in five specific areas: primary prevention, screening, diagnosis, and treatment, research, and development, use of health data and information. The priority of the National Oncology Institute is coordinating and evaluating cancer screening programs in Slovakia. In the domain of research and education, it has established Cancer Trials Register in Slovakia, and regularly announces a call for grant applications for short-term international fellowships for physicians working in the field of oncology.

About CraNE- JA

National Cancer Institute and National Oncology Institute are part of the prestigious European project CraNE Joint Action – JA (complete project name: Network of Comprehensive Cancer Centres-Preparatory activities on creation of National Comprehensive Cancer Centres and EU Networking). This project responds to Flagship Number 5 of Europe's Beating Cancer Plan, which defines that the European Commission will establish by 2025, an EU Network linking recognized National Comprehensive Cancer Centres (CCCs) in every Member State. The Europe's Beating Cancer Plan aims to ensure that 90% of eligible patients have access to such centres by 2030.

The main aim of the CraNE JA is to create an EU network of the already existing and newly established CCCs, to support the implementation of quality-assured early detection, screening, diagnosis, treatment, support to cancer survivors, research and training of the cancer workforce. CraNE JA is preparing the necessary preconditions, administrative, professional, and those related to high-quality performance.

The kick-off meeting of CraNE JA was held on November 3, 2022 at the Permanent Representation of the Republic of Slovenia in Brussels. The project officially started on October 1, 2022. CraNE JA brings together 25 Competent Authorities and 21 Affiliated Entities from 25 different countries, marking 46 partners in total. CraNE JA partners are uniquely placed to implement the network of CCCs in Europe. The target group of CraNE JA are the main actors who will be concerned in the future development of the network of CCCs: representatives of member states, networks of CCCs, European organizations, and experts. Patient advocates and representatives are included in the work of work packages and represented in the Stakeholder Forum.

The CraNE JA project, which will last two years received funding from the European Union through the European Health and Digital Executive Agency (HaDEA) within the framework of the EU Health Program (EU4Health) 2021-2027.

Tit Albreht

Scientific Coordinator of the CraNE-JA

in Health Services Research at the University of Amsterdam, Head of the Centre for Health Care at the National Institute of Public Health of Slovenia, Senior Researcher in the field of health services research, health policy and health systems research, member of the Scientific Committee of EUPHA. He served as President of the Slovenian Preventive Medicine Society between 2016 and 2022 and was elected President-elect of the European Public Health Association for the term 2024-2026. His research and policy work has predominantly been on national and EU policies in health workforce, patient mobility, cancer control and cancer care (the latter two since 2006). He was the scientific coordinator of three EU cancer policy projects, Joint Actions. He is assistant professor of public health at both Slovenian medical faculties as well as at the Faculties of Nursing in Maribor and Jesenice.

Per Magnus Mæhle

Co-leader of WP7 and Co-leader of Substask 5.3.1 of WP5 in the CraNE-JA

holds the position as general manager of the Cancer Centre Board at Oslo University Hospital (OUH) – Comprehensive Cancer Center (CCC). The hospital is a competent authority of Norway in the EU Joint Actions of Crane, Jane, and the new EU CCC Net, and OUH is also a partner in CCI4EU. Mæhle is representing OUH in work package leads in these programs. Mæhle had the position as project manager in two CCC accreditation processes of OUH and has been one of the initiators of the Nordic-Baltic network of CCCs. Previously he has had other leading positions in OUH, the Regional Health Authority in South-Eastern Norway, in private industries, and in the Norwegian Ministry of Finance. Mæhle has PhDs from the Faculty of Medicine and from the Faculty of Social Sciences, University of Oslo, and has been a member of the Board of the Faculty of Social Sciences.





Olga Sapožnikov

International Accreditation Manager, Masaryk Memorial Cancer Institute

Dr. Sapoznikov is part of the team of Masaryk Memorial Cancer Institute in Brno, Czech Republic. As the head of the Accreditation Unit, she deals with whole-institution accreditations, designations, and certification. The work requires involvement in setting of activities, both at institutional level and externally, as well as work on preparation of the institution for external audits, which requires careful gathering and description of existing processes. Important milestones of the Unit were the process of re-accreditation and designation by the Organisation of European Cancer Institutes (OECI) – where the Institute was given the status of Comprehensive Cancer Center, adhesion to European Reference Networks (ERN), obligatory 5-year re-evaluation of membership in ERNs and management of related processes. The Accreditation Unit also supervises the follow up actions drawn after some assessments. In addition, Dr. Sapoznikov is a member of several OECI thematic committees and is an institutional representative in several national and international networks and projects.







Hugo Soares

Co-coordinator, ECHoS Project

Hugo Soares is the co-coordinator of the European project ECHoS, aiming at Establishing Cancer Mission Hubs and to create networks of support to EU Mission on Cancer through synergies and community engagement. Bringing together the expertise of 58 leading organizations, from governmental, healthcare, research, academic, and non-profit sectors, the ECHoS European consortium will ultimately provide member states and associated countries (MS/AC) with the capacity to gradually create National Cancer Mission Hubs.







Hugo is also the co-coordinator of the Portuguese National Cancer Hub (NCH-PT), a structure dedicated to connecting people and organizations to foster the translation of scientific evidence into policies. The NCHPT is oriented towards the implementation of EU Mission on Cancer and EBCP initiatives in the full spectrum of cancer - from fundamental research to clinical research and clinical practice. The NCH-PT catalyses the development of multi-stakeholders' projects and connections to the community in Health, Research and beyond.
